#### An Explorer Visits Oldbury Park

On Wednesday, in Year 4, we had an exciting afternoon! We had a visit from Jamie Buchanan-Dunlop, an RSA Fellow who has also been to the Arctic. We invited him in to share his adventures with us. He told us his last Arctic adventure was six weeks living in an Arctic village. The average temperature was -35°C, which we all agreed was extremely cold. We learned that the snow in the Arctic is very fine like sand, and the Arctic is actually designated as a desert. Jamie told us that he visited the British Arctic Station in Svalbard- which is the fastest warming place on the Earth.

The children discussed glaciers and icebergs with Jamie. They knew crevasses form in glaciers and these could be covered over, therefore making it extremely dangerous for Arctic explorers to investigate. The children saw some beautiful pictures, taken by Jamie, of the Aurora Borealis. Did you know that with all the beautiful colours of the Aurora Borealis, you never see red?

Jamie then went on to discuss the research going on in the Arctic, especially with plastic pollution in the Arctic Ocean and rising water levels. This was a topic that definitely sparked the children's interest as they had a lot to say and plenty of opinions on how to reduce the plastic pollution on our planet.

We talked about the clothing that Arctic explorers need to wear, so, with Jamie's help, Riley was layered up - 31 layers to be precise! Jamie talked about the hardships that the explorers and the researchers go through. They have huskies to pull their sledges, and native dogs from Greenland, similar to a wolf, to guard the station against polar bears.

The youngest person Jamie has ever known to visit the Arctic, was a Year 4 child! This fact inspired all our budding explorers and researchers of the near future. What a wonderful opportunity for our children to meet Jamie this week. Mrs Screen



#### **RSA4 Social Action Project**

#### **Year 4 Swimming**

Please can we remind parents that children need to wear appropriate clothing for swimming. This is trunks for boys (NOT loose fitting swim shorts) and a one-piece costume for girls (preferably not 'frilly' or with excess fabric). This is due to health and safety and the guidance that we have to follow from Worcestershire County Council, Perdiswell Leisure Centre and ASA (Swimming Association).

The guidance also states that all ear-rings should be removed for swimming lessons. If however this is not possible then ear studs can be taped using waterproof tape that needs to be provided by parents.
